

We moved on to Coolamon where we walked the track at Kindra State Forest. The group were thrilled to spot a large number of kangaroos in the bush.


The students were excellent representatives of Junee High School and were attentive to everything that was experienced on the day.

A look into the modern world at Junee High School





To the excitement of staff and students Junee High School recently received three brand new 3D printers. Through the efforts of Mrs Bunyan and Miss Turvey we were able to secure funding to receive these innovative machines. The printers will be used in Technology in Stage 4, across electives in Stage 5 and across many subjects in Stage 6.

But Mr Heydon what is 3D printing?

A brief answer, "It is a process for making a physical object from a three-dimensional digital model, typically by laying down many successive thin layers of a material".

So far it has been a setting up process and getting to know the software. We have created an iPad stand, rabbit, working nut and bolt, working bearing and a USB Cryptex.

With 3D modelling software students will be able to draw their projects and creative ideas into a program

that will allow them to print a scale model. These 3D printers will help equip the students for the modern technological world that we are a part of, providing them with an amazing scope of possibilities.

The free program features interactive hands-on workshops, site visits with industry partners, cultural activities, information about career paths and lunch. Participants also hear inspirational talks from Indigenous and non-Indigenous students, cadets and professionals.

Refugee Week

In celebration of Refugee Week (20 - 26 June), Stage 5 students welcomed special guests to the Learning Centre to learn more about people from refugee backgrounds. Students gained an insight into why we celebrate Refugee Week and the procedures one must



go through after seeking asylum. Being of most value to the staff and students was the opportunity to hear the story of Year 11 Wagga Wagga High student, Ja Ing, who had students captivated by her family's story of courage, hardship and the life changing events that lead them beginning a new life in Wagga Wagga.

A massive thank you to Ja Ing and Javed from Wagga High who took time out of their own school's celebrations to travel to Junee to talk to us and to Dee from the Multicultural Council of Wagga for accompanying the students and offering her expertise.

Ja Ing's Story

My name is Ja Ing Sumlang and I'm in Year 11 at Wagga Wagga High School.

Kachin State is the northernmost state of Myanmar. It is bordered by China to the north and east; Shan State to the south; and Sagaing Region and India to the west. The capital of the state is Myitkyina.

I'm from Burma and I arrived in Australia in March 2012. This week is Refugee Week and I wanted to tell you a little about my family's journey as refugees.

My family left the Kachin state in the north of Burma in 2010 because of the civil war there. The Burmese Army

would come to Kachin villages and take men and force them to be part of the Burmese Army. They tried to stop our people speaking our Kachin language and keeping our Kachin culture. There was much violence against the Kachin people.

The Burmese Army hurt my family only because my family is Kachin. So we wanted to go to a safe country. But my family did not have much money in 2007. My father escaped from Burma and went to work in Malaysia, to be safe from the Burmese Army and to get a job to earn money so our family could be safe away from Burma.

After 3 years, my dad told us to come to Malaysia. We had to go the underground way. We didn't want the Burmese Government to know that we were leaving because they would stop us and could have been killed. So we couldn't take a plane or train, we needed to walk through the forest for 6 hours, without and food or drink, up and down hills and mountains - with just one backpack for my family, which my mum carried. We were very hungry, thirsty and tired as we walked.

About 12 other people from our village escaped with us. A man guided us through the forest to the Thai border and we went across the river, which is the border, at night. In Thailand, another man picked us up and took us by car to Bangkok. It was very crowded in the car with six people on the back seat. We hid in a house there for two days with about 30 people there all together. We had to be very quiet and not speak our language because we had to hide, so no-one knew we were there. One night a truck came to get us. The 30 of us got into the back of the truck – there were no seats or seatbelts and we were driven over the border to Malaysia. I was so tired that I fell asleep and when I woke up the next morning we were in Malaysia.

We lived in Malaysia for two years. For the first year, there was no school we could go to, but then some kind Chinese people started a school for refugees so I was able to go to the school for 3 hours a day.

My family applied for the United Nations Humanitarian Council for Refugees to be classed as refugees. We had to tell our story and then they checked our story before we were given a UN Refugee card. If the Malaysian police caught us without that card we could have been put in prison. My family were very lucky we waited only two years (my father five years) before becoming accepted to Australia. Other Kachin people have waited up to 10 years.



In March 2012, we arrived in Australia for a new life in a new country, with a new language. We arrived in Wagga with some other Kachin families. A couple of weeks after that, I started school at Wagga Wagga High School in Year 7. I was very scared, I didn't speak much English then and I felt alone every day. Gradually I started to make friends.

Now I have lots of friends at school, so I don't feel alone and I don't feel scared because my English is much better and I feel more confident.

Now, my family and I are very happy in Wagga Wagga.

Each week a small group of students visit the residents to participate in a variety of activities and spend time together in an informal social setting.



Information for Parents and Carers

What is the National Data Collection?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (the national data collection) is an annual collection that counts the number of school students with disability and the level of reasonable educational adjustment they are provided with.

The national data collection counts students who have been identified by a school team as receiving an adjustment to address a disability under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* (the DDA).

What is the benefit for my child?

The aim of the national data collection is to collect quality information about school students with disability in Australia.

This information will help teachers, principals, education authorities and families to better support students with disability to take part in school on the same basis as students without disability.

The national data collection is an opportunity for schools to review their learning and support systems and processes to continually improve education outcomes for their students with disability.

Who will be included in the National Data Collection?

The definition of disability for the national data collection is based on the broad definition under the DDA.

For the purposes of the national data collection, students with learning difficulties such as dyslexia or auditory processing disorder as well as chronic health conditions like epilepsy, diabetes or asthma, that require active monitoring by the school, may be included.

What information will be collected?

Every year your child's school will collect the following information for each student with a disability:

- the student's level of education (i.e. primary or secondary)
- the student's level of adjustment
- the student's broad type of disability.

The information collected by schools will be provided to all governments to inform policy and programme improvement for students with disability.

How will my child's privacy be protected?

Protecting the privacy and confidentiality of all students and their families is essential. Personal details such as student names or other identifying information will not be provided to local or federal education authorities.
