Bullying can be a concern for students and families when it occurs at school. Bullying occurs in all areas of society, as we see it played out at workplaces, in parliament, in the media and in local clubs as well.

At times, it is the person's perception that things are not right and they are being bullied. Alternatively, the other person's perception that they were just pointing something out and it came across as mean. Our students are developing their understanding of appropriate behaviour and sometimes need reminding, re-teaching and reinforcement of our expected behaviours. The Wellbeing team listed above, are certainly a great assistance to students and parents who would like to discuss wellbeing concerns of their child.

Child Protection is important for all society, with schools expected to be safe places. At times, there are concerns about a child's welfare. School staff are mandatory reporters under the Keeping Them Safe legislation.

The NSW <u>Mandatory Reporter Guide (MRG)</u> is a tool intended to complement mandatory reporters' professional judgment and critical thinking.

The MRG supports mandatory reporters in NSW to:

- determine whether a report to the Child Protection Helpline is needed for concerns about possible abuse or neglect of a child or young person; and
- identify alternative supports for vulnerable children, young people and their families.

The decision tree categories that can be selected are:

Physical Abuse -

You suspect a non-accidental injury or physical harm to a child/young person may have been caused by a parent/carer or other adult household member. You know of treatment of a child/young person by a parent/carer or other adult household member that may have caused or is likely to cause an injury or physical harm.

Neglect -

Supervision; Shelter/Environment; Food: Hygiene/Clothing; Medical Care; Mental Health Care; Education - Not Enrolled; Education - Habitual Absence. You suspect that a parent/carer is not adequately meeting a child's/young person's needs medical such as: supervision, shelter, care, hygiene/clothing, mental health care, schooling/education, nutrition, or other basic needs. A child/young person is a danger to self or others and parents/carers are not supervising or providing care.

Sexual Abuse -

Child; Young Person; Problematic Sexual Behaviour toward Others

Sexual abuse is sexual activity or behaviour that is imposed, or is likely to be imposed, on a child/young person by another person. Select this decision tree if you are concerned/worried that a child or young person is at risk of sexual abuse or sexually harming another child or young person.

Psychological Harm -

A child/young person appears to be experiencing psychological/emotional distress and is a danger to self or others as a consequence of parent/carer behaviour. An underage marriage or similar union, where one of both partners is under 18 has occurred.

Danger to Self or Others -

A child/young person is demonstrating suicidal or selfharming behaviours. A child/young person is a danger to self or others and the reporter does not know whether the parent/carer behaviours contributed now or in the past.

Relinquishing Care -

Parent/carer states they will not or cannot continue to provide care for a child under the age of 16 or a young person over 16 and they are unable to make an informed decision (temporarily or permanently). Child/young person is in voluntary care for longer than legislation allows.

Carer Concern -

Substance Abuse; Mental Health; Domestic Violence A child/young person is significantly affected by carer concerns such as substance abuse, mental health or domestic violence.

Unborn Child -

You are concerned for the welfare of an unborn child at birth.

If you have concerns about a young person at risk, you can use the Mandatory Reporting Guide yourself, or contact a staff member who can assist with your concerns.

Family Referral Service (FRS)

The Family Referral Service (FRS) and JHS have partnered to provide greater access to service for local communities. The FRS is aimed at assisting families to link into various support services.

These may include;

- Housing and accommodation
- Financial assistance
- Parenting
- Drug and alcohol support
- Domestic violence
- Youth support
- Health
- Counselling and mediation
- Mental health
- Cultural support
- Health and wellbeing
- Transport to local services/appointments

Additionally the FRS in school project is working to develop and implement programs to work with young people. Some of the supports that can be offered to JHS students to improve their social-emotional skills are; Initiatic Art Therapy, Managing The Bull (MTB), Re-Navigating Anger and Guilty Emotions (RAGE) programs which can also be run in groups or an individualised basis with young people and their families.

A number of families have already utilised the service and we extend a warm welcome to young people and their families to make contact with the Family Worker. The Family Worker for JHS is Sam, who can be reached on Mondays at the school or on 1300 307 897.

In conjunction with the Family Referral Service (FRS) and Phoenix Wings Wellness, Junee High School students will be able to access an Initiatic Art Therapy program. This program is run over four weeks at JHS, and can be accessed for free. It operates in small groups, with students conducting art therapy to express their emotions, with mindfulness and resilience training. Mel is available for students wishing to access one-on-one counselling at JHS by appointments only.
