Principal's Message

Tell Them From Me

We will again participate in the Tell Them From Me school survey, allowing students, parents and teachers their input about Junee HS. Students will be allocated time during class in the next 2 months to complete this survey, as a follow up from the term 1 and previous year's surveys.

Parents and staff will be provided with instructions and a login to complete the survey. Parents may complete the survey here at school, where we will have dedicated electronic devices available from the office.

Parent Survey:

Parents have the opportunity to participate in the *Partners in Learning* parent survey on student engagement. The survey asks parents and carers questions about different factors that are known to impact on student wellbeing and engagement.

Running this survey will help our school understand parents' and carers' perspectives on their child's experience at school. These include: communication between parents/carers and staff, activities and practices at home and parent/carer views on the school's support of learning and behaviour. This valuable feedback will help our school make practical improvements.

The survey is conducted entirely online on smartphones, ipads, tablets, laptops or computers. The survey will typically take 15 minutes or less to complete and is completely confidential. The parent survey will be conducted between 21 August and 13 October. Although participating in the survey is entirely voluntary, your responses are very much appreciated.

Student Survey:

The survey measures factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other student outcomes. The focus of the NSW-wide survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices. You may remember that our students also participated in a *Tell Them From Me* student survey in Term 1 this year. Asking students to complete the survey twice in one year allows us to identify trends in student responses as well as track engagement and motivation across the school year.

The survey is a great opportunity for our students to provide us with valuable and quick feedback on what they think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the *Tell Them From Me* survey to help improve how they do things at school.

EMPOWER

2018 will see our EMPOWER Self-Select classes for Stage 4 and Stage 5 continue.

Thank you to the parents and students that were able to attend the information session held on Wednesday evening. Students or parents are still able to pick up an application form from me. These applications are due on Friday 15 September.

Monitoring Books

Occasionally student behaviour results in the student being placed on a Monitoring Book. Students when on a monitoring Book will attend roll call in Room 1 and speak to an Executive staff member to help them be positive in their behaviour. If a student is given an unsatisfactory rating in their book, they will be spending the rest of the school day at the office to complete their work there. They will be isolated from other students during recess and lunch, but still have the opportunity for toilet breaks and for their food breaks.

Subject Selection

Thank you to students, along with their parents quickly selecting their subjects using the new online facility.

A reminder that 2017 Subject fees are compulsory and need to be paid as soon as possible. 2018 elective subjects are dependent upon the compulsory subject fees being paid. Students may also be at risk of not being able to attend extra-curricular activities if these fees are not paid.

Bible Study

A student is organising a weekly Bible study on Thursday's at lunchtime. This can be approved by the school principal and organised under the "Religious Education Implementation Procedures" Voluntary student activities of a religious nature in schools.

Voluntary religious activities and prayer groups are not part of special religious education, but may operate under the auspices and supervision of the principal. Principals in their supervision of voluntary religious activities and prayer groups must ensure that:

- Parental permission is obtained

If you and your child agree that they may attend the Bible study, please collect a permission note from the office. This note needs to be signed and returned before the student can attend the group.

YES program

Fact sheet for parents and carers

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Planning has begun to move NAPLAN from a pen and paper assessment to an online assessment.

What are the benefits of NAPLAN Online?

Results will be faster and more precise

- Your child's individual results will be returned to you within just a few weeks of the NAPLAN testing.
- Online assessment will reduce the time it takes to mark and provide feedback to schools, teachers and parents.
