Tell Them From Me

We will again participate in the Tell Them From Me school survey, allowing students, parents and teachers their input about Junee HS. Students will be allocated time during class in the next 2 months to complete this survey, as a follow up from the Term One and previous year's surveys.

Parents and staff will be provided with instructions and a login to complete the survey. Parents may complete the survey here at school, where we will have dedicated electronic devices available at the office.

1. Parent Survey: Parents have the opportunity to participate in the *Partners in Learning* parent survey on student engagement. The survey asks parents and carers questions about different factors that are known to impact on student wellbeing and engagement.

Running this survey will help our school understand parents' and carers' perspectives on their child's experience at school. These include: communication between parents/carers and staff, activities and practices at home and parent/carer views on the school's support of learning and behaviour. This valuable feedback will help our school make practical improvements.

The survey is conducted entirely online on smartphones, ipads, tablets, laptops or computers. The survey will typically take 15 minutes or less to complete and is completely confidential. The parent survey will be conducted between Tuesday 27 August and Friday 25 October 2019. Although participating in the survey is entirely voluntary, your responses are very much appreciated.

2. Student Survey: The survey measures factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other student outcomes. The focus of the NSW-wide survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices.

You may remember that our students also participated in a *Tell Them From Me* student survey in Term 1 this year. Asking students to complete the survey twice in one year allows us to identify trends in student responses as well as track engagement and motivation across the school year.

The survey is a great opportunity for our students to provide us with valuable and quick feedback on what they think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the *Tell Them From Me* survey to help improve how they do things at school.

than 30 minutes to complete. It will be administered during school hours between Tuesday 27 August and Friday 25 October 2019. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary.

School Ball

There is still the risk that a student may not be allowed to attend the School Ball, due to misbehaviour, not enough attendance at school, not regularly being in school uniform or compulsory elective subject fees not being paid. If you are concerned that your child may be excluded or have questions about the School Ball, please make an appointment to speak to me.

EMPOWER

We have been surveying parents, students and staff about our 2020 curriculum and role of Empower. These surveys are providing valuable information about the structure of our classes, learning and how student voice is important in their schooling. More information about Empower will be out soon, after a thorough analysis of the survey results.

Subject Selection

Thank you to students with their parents attending the Subject Selection evening. We are working on having students select their subjects during class time in the next week. Students should be informed of their electives by the beginning of Term 4.

A reminder that 2019 Subject fees are compulsory and need to be paid ASAP. 2020 elective subjects are dependent upon the compulsory subject fees being paid. Students may also be at risk of not being able to attend extra-curricular activities if these fees are not paid.

Religious Education in Junee HS

Junee HS hosts a weekly Bible study on Thursday's at lunchtime. This can be approved by the school principal and organised under the "Religious Education Implementation Procedures" Voluntary student activities of a religious nature in schools.

Voluntary religious activities and prayer groups are not part of special religious education, but may operate under the auspices and supervision of the principal. Principals in their supervision of voluntary religious activities and prayer groups must ensure that:

- parental permission is obtained
- the content of the activities undertaken are monitored
- students or members of religious persuasions do not engage in attempts to proselytise or convert non-adherents of their religion to their faith in the course of school authorised activities.

If you and your child agree that they may attend the Bible study, please collect a permission note from the office. This note needs to be signed and returned before the student can attend the group.

We also host Mr Lucas King as a school Chaplain. Lucas attends our school each Friday and is available to assist students in a range of wellbeing activities. Lucas is a great support to students and staff, providing activities and advice for a range of people. His role **does not** include trying to "convert" people and preach about his faith.

Junee Christian Education Board organises Christian Special Religious Education (SRE) for Junee HS in the form of scripture lessons to Stage 4. Weeks 5 to 9 sees our school host Scripture classes for Year 7 and 8. Students in Year 7 must "opt-in" by providing a note from parents allowing their child to attend scripture. Students in Year 8 are automatically placed in a scripture class. Students can "opt-out" by providing a note from parents allowing their child to attend scripture. Students who "opt-out" are placed in a class to discuss values and wellbeing information with their class teacher and chaplain.

Be an Au Pair

Wondering what to do with the gap year you're keen to take, or how to make it possible financially?

There are lots of options, but if you'd like to travel, immerse yourself in everyday life in another country, and experience things other travellers won't necessarily get chance too. You could consider becoming an Au Pair.

What will be expected of you?

You'll live with a host family. In return for your accommodation and food, and usually a little bit of spending money, you'll look after their children and maybe do some light household chores.

Benefits include:

You get to travel safely.

Living with a family, you'll make new friends, get to learn more about other languages, cultures, try new food and see how people really live in other parts of the world.

You'll be financially stable while you travel.

And you'll be getting valuable work experience that will look great on your CV too.

Who would it suit?

If you love children, are sociable, responsible, and willing to be flexible and get stuck in, then being an au pair could be perfect for you.

Get started

There are lots of different agencies who will happily sign you up as an au pair.

Spend a bit of time researching the companies, their track records, and find out what the differences are.

Once you've made your choice, you'll have to register (there will most likely be a fee involved). Then search for an available host family in the country you'd like to visit.

Have an online interview with the family to see if you suit one another. Ask questions, find out what's expected of you and make sure you're happy with the situation.

If you go ahead, you'll then need to sign a contract and fill out any necessary paperwork. You might need to get a police check, and apply for a visa if necessary. Then get ready for your trip.



An amazing effort from the Staff and students who put their hands to baking last week with cakes of their favourite books.







Workshops



Rural and regional school travel

Apply online for free school travel in rural and regional NSW. You only need to complete one form, even for Journeys using more than one operator.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for free school travel, students may need to live a minimum distance from their school:

Years K-2 (Infants)

There is no minimum distance.

Years 3-6 (Primary)

More than 1.6km straight line distance or at least 2.3km walking.

Years 7-12 (Secondary)

More than 2.0km straight line distance or at least 2.9km walking.

Who needs to apply

You only need to apply if the student has never been approved for free school travel before. Students in a shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody) should submit a separate application for both addresses.

How to update your details

You need to update student details online if the student is changing their name, address, school or campus, or their Transport operator. You can update them at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails/#updateDetails

Frequently asked questions

Does the approved free travel include travel outside school hours?

Approved free school travel is only for travel to and from school. So for travel after hours, on weekends or during school holidays, students will need to buy a ticket.

What if there's no public transport in my area?

In areas where there is no public transport, you may be able to get a subsidy for driving the student to school. For details, visit transportnsw.info/school-students

How do I apply if the student needs to travel from two addresses because the parents live separately?

Each parent (or the student if aged 16 or over) needs to apply separately for each address. The same minimum distances apply.

How to apply for free travel for the first time

You can apply for free school travel for next year from the start of Term 4 this year.

Step 1

Once you have enrolled your child at the new school, apply online by giving your home address and telling us which bus company the student needs to travel with between home and school. You can apply online at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/home#/howToApply

Step 2

The school then confirms to us that your details are correct.

Step 3

We will then work on your application. You will get an email confirming if the student is approved for free travel. If so, we will tell your local bus company who may send a school travel pass (if needed) to your school or, in some cases, the bus company will contact you directly about travel arrangements.

A parent or guardian must apply for students aged 15 years and under. Students who are 16 years and over must apply for themselves.

The School Opal card

The School Opal card gives eligible students free or discounted travel between home and school using metro, train, bus, ferry and light rail services you nominate in your application.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for a School Opal card, students may need to live a minimum distance from their school:

Years K-2 (Infants)

There is no minimum distance.

Years 3-6 (Primary)

More than 1.6km straight line distance or at least 2.3km walking.

Years 7-12 (Secondary)

More than 2.0km straight line distance or at least 2.9km walking.

i If you live too close to be eligible for free travel, you may still qualify for a School Term Bus Pass, which offers travel on buses between home and school at a discounted rate for the whole school term.

Who needs to apply

A new application is only required if the student has not had a School Opal card before.

If the student already has a School Opal card and is changing schools, campuses or home address, you will need to update their Opal card for the new school year before mid-December at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts

How to apply

Applications for next year open at the start of Term 4 this year.

Step 1

Once the new school has confirmed your child's enrolment, complete the application at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts

Step 2

The school endorses your application.

Step 3

Once Transport for NSW has approved the application, a School Opal card will be sent to the address provided on the application.

i A parent or guardian must apply for students 15 years and under. Students 16 years and over can apply for themselves.



Better together

The School Opal card is only for travel to and from school. So it's a good idea to get a Child/Youth Opal card for travel after hours, on weekends or during school holidays.

Child/Youth Opal card benefits

- Concession fares across the Opal network
- Half-price travel after eight paid journeys each week*
- \$1 transfer discount for every transfer between modes (metro/train, ferry, bus or light rail) as part of one journey within 60 minutes from the last tap off†
- Set auto top up and link it to your credit or debit card so there's always enough value on the card to travel.

Information on HSC minimum standards test

The HSC minimum standard

The HSC minimum standard is part of an effort to improve the literacy and numeracy outcomes for students. From 2020, students in NSW will need to demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive their HSC. The HSC minimum standard is a way of supporting and ensuring students have a functional level of literacy and numeracy.

The HSC minimum standard is set at Level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework which outlines the functional skills used in everyday life, for work and further study.

This framework provides detailed information on the three areas in which the students will be tested: Reading, Writing and Numeracy.

How does a student show that they have achieved the HSC minimum standard?

If a student sat the 2017 NAPLAN test and earned a band 8 in reading, writing and numeracy they will be deemed as meeting the HSC minimum standard in Reading, Writing and Numeracy and will not have to sit the HSC minimum standard tests. Any student, regardless of when they complete their HSC, who did not receive a band 8 in reading, writing or numeracy in 2017 NAPLAN will be required to sit the HSC minimum standard test in all areas in which they did not receive a band 8. The student must achieve a level 3 in each test. This aligns with level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF) which is considered the level required to function in everyday life, for work and further study.

The current year 10 and the online HSC minimum standard tests

To achieve an HSC in 2021 and beyond, all students must sit the HSC minimum standard online tests in reading, writing and numeracy. Each of the three tests are of 45 minutes duration. The writing test consists of a response of up to 500 words to one written or visual prompt, and the other two are 45 multiple choice questions. Schools will advise you when your child will sit the online tests. Before doing this, however, students can complete the online practice tests at school using their Schools Online account as many times as is practicable. Once the HSC minimum standard is achieved in all three areas, a student is eligible to receive the HSC.


The administration of these tests is an important job in a school. Parent support of this administration is very important, especially in ensuring student attendance. A letter will be sent to parents/carers about the timing of the tests. Having students attend school punctually and ready to sit the test will be very much appreciated by the team of staff involved.

The current year 11 and the HSC 2020

Students sitting the HSC in 2020 will be the first to have their HSC linked to a minimum standard. For these students now in Year 11, the minimum standard is linked to their 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN results. Many students have already met the standard through achieving a band 8 or higher in all three areas: reading, writing and numeracy. Those who are yet to achieve the standard will sit online tests in the area where they achieved below a band 8 in numeracy, reading or writing. Students can sit the online tests twice a year, in Year 11 and 12 and up to five years after they start the HSC.

What is a minimum standard report?

Students can access their minimum standard test results through their Schools Online account. They can also print a minimum standard report that clearly shows the level (1-4) that they achieved in the test. Level 3 is the minimum standard.



Support for students with additional needs

Some students with additional needs will be eligible for provisions for the minimum standard tests. These provisions can be approved by the principal.

This means it is a good idea to make sure the learning support team at the school is fully aware of the needs that concern you and that you have acquired documentation that confirms your child's additional needs. The earlier that the school is aware of the needs, the better prepared the school will be to determine both the timing of the test and the extra provisions that will enable your child to have equitable access to the test.

The learning support team will liaise with the principal about extra provisions for the HSC minimum standard tests.

Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation

1. What is the Partners in Learning parent survey?
The Partners in Learning parent survey is part of the *Tell Them From Me* suite of surveys on student engagement. The parent survey helps to clarify and strengthen the important relationship between parent and school.

2. What kind of questions will the survey ask?
The survey questions aim to understand parents' perspectives on their child's experience at school, including teaching, communication and the school's support of learning and behaviour. The survey also aims to understand parents' perspectives on activities and practices at home related to their child's learning.

3. How have schools been selected to take part?
The survey is open to all NSW government schools at no cost to them. Your school has decided to participate.

4. How will taking part in this survey benefit my child's school?
The parent survey provides school principals and school leaders with parents' perspectives on their school as well as learning at home. Communication between parents and staff, activities and practices at home, and parent views on the school's support of learning and behaviour help build an accurate and timely picture that schools can use for practical improvements. Data collected from the survey responses are quickly compiled into reports for school leaders. Principals can then use this information to help them identify emerging issues and plan for school improvement.

5. How does the parent survey relate to the student survey?
The parent survey is complementary to the *Tell Them From Me* student survey that your child may have been asked to complete. These surveys are offered (along with a teacher survey) to ensure schools can capture the views of students, teachers and parents.
