2021 Curriculum, Classes and Empower

We have begun planning 2021 curriculum and staffing, with Stage 5 & Year 11 electives mostly sorted.

We have a large Year 7 group coming in, as well as other large groups in Years 8 and 9.

In 2021, we are planning on the following, however your feedback is welcome:

- Three Year 7 classes for the majority of subjects and four mixed classes for Technology and Art
- Two Year 8 classes for the majority of subjects and three mixed classes for Technology and Art
- Stage 5 being split into Year 9 and 10 separate classes for non-elective subjects (English, Maths, Science, Geography, History, PDHPE) and Careers. Electives will continue to be mixed across the two year groups
- Year 11: 14 classes available. Students and their parents may discuss with me the possibility of distance education courses such as Aurora College online classes, Finigan Distance Education or a Languages school
- Special Interest Period will not continue, with more time reallocated to History, Geography and PDHPE. We will work on providing these opportunities from Special interest in other ways.

CBCA awards SHORTLISTed Books 2020

BOOK OF THE YEAR: YOUNGER READERS

Catch a Falling Star Author: Meg McKinlay Publisher: Walker Books Australia



The publisher says...

It's 1979 and the sky is falling. Skylab, that is. Somewhere high above Frankie Avery, one of the world's first space stations is tumbling to Earth. And rushing back with it are old memories. Things twelveyear-old Frankie thought she'd forgotten. Things her mum won't talk about, and which her little brother Newt never knew. Only ... did he? Does he? Because as Skylab circles closer, Newt starts acting strangely. And while the world watches the sky, Frankie keeps her own eyes on Newt. Because if anyone's going to keep him safe, it's her. It always has been. But maybe this is something bigger than splinters and spiders and sleepwalking. Maybe a space station isn't the only thing heading straight for calamity.

The author says...

This is an exceptional coming-of-age story which sensitively deals with loss, grief and change. Set in Western Australia in 1979, as the world waits for Skylab to tumble to Earth, the historical context offered is original and fascinating while the plot revolves around Frankie, her brother and her mother. Frankie establishes a strong relationship with the reader, revealing her thoughts and motivations clearly. The reader can understand her grief over losing her father, the difficulties of living in a single-parent home, and

the deep responsibility she feels for her brother. Minor characters provide comic relief. The plot builds gently as the characters anticipate the landing of Skylab pieces. Other points of tension include the increasing conflict between Frankie and her friend Kat, Newt's obsession with Skylab, which leads him to take greater risks, and the emotional buildup of suppressed grief. The strands of the plot are skilfully interwoven and the 'falling' metaphor works brilliantly. While there are many references to science and space stations, the story is ultimately about the human heart.

BOOK OF THE YEAR: OLDER READERS

When the Ground is Hard Author: Malla Nunn Publisher: Allen & Unwin



The publisher says...

Adele loves being one of the popular girls at Keziah Christian Academy. She knows the upcoming semester at school will be great with her best friend Delia at her side. Then Delia dumps her for a new girl with more money, and Adele is forced to share a room with Lottie, the school pariah, who doesn't pray and defies teachers' orders. As they share a copy of Jane Eyre, Lottie's gruff exterior and honesty grow on Adele, and together they take on bullies and protect each other from the vindictive and prejudiced teachers. When a boy goes missing on campus, Adele and Lottie must work together to solve the mystery, in the process learning the true meaning of friendship.

The CBCA judges say...

Set in a boarding school in 1960s Swaziland, this novel deftly explores complex structures of race, class and gender. While the setting of a small country in Africa will be foreign to most readers, the power play between teenage girls is universal and recognisable and the added element of a missing boy moves the book into the mystery genre and will be sure to hold the reader's attention. The setting is evocative, and the author uses rich language to portray an experience of Africa that many readers will not be familiar with. The main character undergoes a significant journey of personal growth and exploration during which she is forced to confront her own prejudices and question the societal structures that navigate her life. Lyrical prose, excellent sense of place, important themes explored with sensitivity and the author's unique perspective gives us a book with high literary merit and a fresh view of the teenage experience.

Tell Them From Me student survey: Information and consent form for parents and carers Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation

Dear Parents and Carers

This term, your school is taking part in the *Tell Them <u>Erom</u> Me* student survey. The survey will provide us with valuable feedback on what our students think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the *Tell Them <u>Erom</u> Me* survey to help them improve. The survey is completed on-line and is run by an independent research company, **The Learning Bar**, which specialises in school-based surveys.

Staff in schools will **not** be able to identify individual students from their responses. To ensure confidentiality, participating students will receive a unique username and password. Where fewer than five students respond to a question, the results will be suppressed. The survey typically takes 30 minutes or less to complete and will be administered by the school during normal school hours. Once the surveys are completed by students, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days.

This survey will help our school better understand how to improve student wellbeing and engagement. It will help the school identify what works to improve student outcomes.

Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary. Your child will not take part if either you or your child do not wish. If, during the survey, your child is uncomfortable, he/she can choose to stop the survey at any time. The majority of questions in the survey can be skipped.

If you <u>do not want</u> your child to take part in the survey, please complete the attached form and return it to your child's school by Friday 23 October.
